The Karmapas

The head of the Kagyu lineage of Tibetan Buddhism, the Karmapas were the first reincarnate lamas in the Tibetan Buddhist system, and they date back to the 13th Century.

His Holiness the 17th Gyalwa Karmapa, Orgyen Trinley Dorje, made his first trip to the United States in May of 2008, traveling to his main seat in North America Karma Triyana Dharmachakra Monastery in the mountains above Woodstock New York, thus fulfilling his promise to return made in his previous incarnation.

Margaret and I have been students of the Venerable Khenpo Karthar Rinpoche for almost 30 years. We have watched Rinpoche follow the directives of the 16th Karmapa to build a traditional Tibetan-style monastery and residence for monks, as well as a complete 3-year retreat center, one for men and another for women.

Equally important are the many thousands of students like ourselves that Rinpoche has taught, helping to turn our minds toward the path of authentic dharma.






The Heart Center
